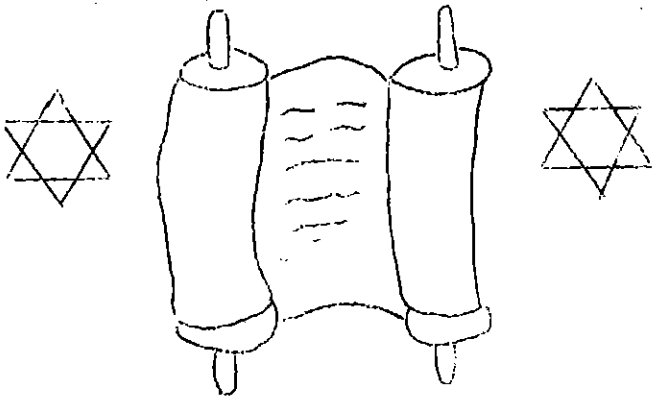
Message from the Head Counsellor

The following morning, after some threatening weather, the Blue Team came out fighting to even up the score. They started on the right foot by taking the senior softball game and the soph T-Ball game. But the de-

termined White Team bounced back by sweeping the Sub basketball, inter volleyball and junior soccer. The afternoon lineup and the award for the best team banner went to the Blues and things seemed to look merrier for the Blue Jokers as they took the traditional observation test, senior volleyball and sub soccer. While this was going on the White Aces kept pace by sweeping waiter basketball and the tug-o-wars. The evening lineup was split and the White Team took the evening activity of spello.
